Yet many non-casual ECAs have little knowledge of their casually employed peers and the contributions they make to the University. To be casually employed means not having access to any form of leave including sick leave, contracts as short as 4 months and lack of access to most forms of institutional funding, training or support.

Find out why teaching wasn't on the radar for Melissa five years ago, why she has weekly team meetings with her students and why she felt moved almost to tears in week 12. More...




